CLOSE TO THE LOSS

For each of the more than 58,000 Americans who died in Vietnam, there was a family, friends and a community forever changed by their loss.

Many of the items left immediately following the dedication of The Wall are also the most personal – placed there by those closest to the departed. Family members, friends, and classmates left comic books, baseball gloves, photographs, and other childhood mementos when their loss was still so near.

Themes of heartbroken family members and unfinished lives remind us of the ripple effect of the Vietnam War on American families and communities.
